


The property known as the Wintergreen property is located at 5320 County Road C in the Town of Wyoming, Iowa County, Wisconsin.

The one-story building was constructed during 1989 and is about 15,000 square feet, plus a partial, unfinished basement that is about 15,000 square feet+/-. The building is located at the top of the hill and has beautiful views to the north of the Wisconsin River, bluffs and the village of Spring Green. Historically, the property functioned as a downhill ski operation. This use was discontinued 30 years ago. For many years the building has been utilized as an event center/banquet hall for hosting weddings, large parties, business meetings, and similar events.


The property is comprised of 9 adjoining legally described parcels. There are 3 zoning designations. Property is served by a private well. Septic waste is through the Sanitary Sewer District. Natural Gas goes to the main building.







Wood fireplaces centrally located. One in the bar area and one in the main banquet room.













## the History of Wintergreen Ski Area

Former Miami NFL owner Bud Keland, who also served as vice-president of Johnson Wax in Racine, developed Wintergreen Ski Area on land that had belonged to Frank Lloyd Wright's estate beginning in 1968. The ski hill was to be the third phase of the development, along with a restaurant, designed by Wright himself, and a golf course. The restaurant was completed before the ski hill opened for New Year's, 1969, but the golf course didn't open until later. The hill was planned to be, and in in fact was, an "upside-down area" for the entirety of its existence. Keland originally planned a nine-story lodge at the top of the hill, along with fishing ponds, skeet shooting ranges, skating rinks, archery ranges, snowmobile trails, tennis courts, and a marina. Those lofty plans resulted in a simple, rectangular wood building which sat partially completed the initial season. That building remained for over twenty years. If you wanted to plan a ski area, you needed a European to do the job right, so Keland hired an Austrian, legendary Toni Matt, and a Swede, Gosta Johnson to plan the area and the snowmaking equipment. Wintergreen was steep, by Midwestern standards. One headwall dipped just below 50% pitch, and this reputation attracted a small diehard following over the years. The first season, it hit 3500-4000 skiers a month in January and was getting about 400 skiers through its ski school. Unfortunately, by 1971, the owners tamed the steep pitches at the top of Wintergreen to make it more palatable for novice skiers who they believed might be scared away by Wintergreen's reputation. This early version of Wintergreen had eight runs, with only one novice-posted run, alongside three intermediate runs and four expert runs, adding an intermediate run that same year to also broaden the appeal of the area. It had two double chairlifts and a J-bar. Three slopes had lights in the early days and there was, of course, snowmaking on the north-facing hill. It was always listed at 400 feet vertical.

The hill closed from 1972-1974, when a \$2 million dollar project was to be initiated to further regrade the slopes, add two more runs and install two new chairlifts. It reopened for the 1974-1975 season at a time when the ski craze began to settle down and the American economy was unwell. By 1978, the area increased to nine runs with four serviced by lights.

The downhill area closed in 1986 due to high insurance costs and some poor winters. Owner Robert Graves sold off 3500 of the 5000 acres he owned in the valley surrounding the ski hill. He kept the golf resort, restaurant and cross-country trails across the highway open, though. A \$2.1 million renovation project at Wintergreen began in 1989. Taliesin Associated Architects designed the new chalet (on the foundation of the never-started nine-story lodge Bud Keland has planned), so it has the lines you're accustomed to seeing in Wright-style buildings. The J-bar was moved to a newly-constructed bunny hill.

Wintergreen Ski Area closed in 1991.
